The Rotary Foundation creates channel for direct humanitarian support in Ukraine region

More than 2 million people have fled Ukraine and are in dire need of emergency aid. The United Nations estimates that number could grow to as many as 5 million people displaced. Rotary clubs in Europe and around the world have stepped up their relief work, some working on the ground to help displaced families.

In response to the deepening humanitarian crisis in Ukraine, The Rotary Foundation has created an official channel for donors around the world to contribute funds to support the relief efforts underway by Rotary districts and has designated its Disaster Response Fund as the main avenue for contributions. The Rotary Foundation Trustees have decided to prioritize contributions made to the **Disaster Response**Fund until 30 April 2022 to support disaster response grants for districts affected by these events. Individuals and clubs are welcome to make contributions to this fund,

ShelterBox, our project partner for disaster response, is in communication with Rotarians in Eastern Europe to explore how it may offer support with temporary transitional housing and other essential supplies. You can make a contribution to ShelterBox on its website - at **The Ukraine Crisis Explained - ShelterBox USA**.

You may also donate directly to relief efforts underway in Rotary District 2241 (Romania and Republic of Moldova). Read the article directly below this for more specifics on that opportunity.

Support Romanian and Moldovan Rotarians as They Respond to Needs in Ukraine



We are deeply concerned about the situation and people in the Ukraine. Thanks to our Buckhead Rotarian Radu Zernoveanu we have information for action. Radu's father is a Rotarian in Romania. Due to this relationship, we have very current information on the needs and process for sending support.

Current Refugee Situation in Ukraine

- the queues to cross borders are longer than 30 miles
- the weather in Ukraine is treacherous (freezing temperatures, snowing, windy)
- the refugees are mostly comprised of women, elderly, and children as young as newborns (who are being born in refugee camps)
- the Ukrainians have created refugee camps close to the borders
- in the cities directly affected by the war, they are lacking food, clean water, personal products, medication, medical supplies, medical equipment

Rotary Response in D2241

Rotary Districts 2241 and 2232 (Ukraine & Belarus) have created an efficient supply chain process as follows:

- District 2241 Rotary Clubs along the border are in direct contact with Rotary Clubs in Ukraine (some of them are sister clubs) and are centralizing the needs of the Ukrainian population and of the refugees
- Based on the centralized needs, the D2241 RCs acquire the needed products and are delivering them in trucks to club representatives in Ukraine (as can be seen in the attached pictures)
- from there, the Ukrainian clubs are redistributing the items to clubs across Ukraine and targeted population
- in D2241 they have fundraised so far approximately \$50,000 from clubs and Rotarians

Financial Needs

- The refugees are expected to arrive at the borders in waves. Up to now, there are close to 1M refugees who left Ukraine.
- The first wave that is now approaching its end, was comprised of people with better means (people with cars, money, specific destinations to relatives and friends, etc.).
- Another wave that is already approaching that is estimated to be \sim 5M refugees is expected to be comprised of people with much higher needs.
- The population that is not fleeing has an ever-increasing need of food, water, personal products, medication, medical supplies, and medical equipment
- Because of the above, the financial needs of D2241 are increasing every day in order to respond to the needs expressed by the Ukrainian clubs.

Rotary International Response

There is a coordination committee assigned by RI Board and General Secretary John Hewko: RID Katerina Kotsali-Papadimitriou, RPIC Mykola Stebljanko, and PDG Vira Syryamina. They are in constant contact with the districts that are responding to the crisis and are advising on when and how the money should be used inside Ukraine.





Georgia Rotary Student Program Chair Bert Guy announced Sarah Grace Thompson of Peachtree City and Nicole Emily Kincaid of Columbus as two of five college students from Georgia selected to represent GRSP with scholarships offered by the Rotarians of Oslo, Norway for the International Summer School at the University of Oslo. Thompson, who is a student at Berry College, and Kincaid, who attends Columbus State University, will represent District 6900 with the endorsement of GRSP 6900 District Chair Ian Bond and his scholarship committee.

The six-week program from June 27 to August 5, 2022 includes air fares from Atlanta-Oslo and return to Atlanta, a field tour to Bergen (administered by the University of Oslo), room, board, 12-credit hours of undergraduate coursework, administrative fees at the International Summer School at the University of Oslo plus visiting for one week with Norwegian Rotary host families. The recipients of the scholarships must pay their travel expense to and from Atlanta airport, and provide their own personal spending

money.

Thompson said her college experience has encouraged her to balance work, academics and her social life. She is the daughter of Richard and Jennifer Thompson. Her

father is a member of the **Rotary Club of Peachtree City**. In a letter of recommendation for Thompson from the HackBerry Lab Director Zane Cochran wrote, "One of her greatest qualities is her ability to connect personally with the students she helps and is able to teach difficult concepts by leading students on a pathway of discovery, rather than just telling them answers."

Kincaid stated her desire to study foreign languages as well as political science and economics sparked her desire to apply for the international scholarship. She is the daughter of Kent Kincaid and Melody Johnson and recommended by Rotarian Eric Spears of the **Rotary Club of Columbus**. In a letter of recommendation for Kincaid, Coordinator of International Education at CSU Brooke Quarterman wrote, "Ms. Kincaid's various community service involvement includes participating in Columbus State University's Day of Service, caring for the animals of PAWS Humane, and providing her expertise and attention to Solid Rock Church's Nursery. While her commitment to her church and community are evident, she doesn't let it get in the way of her academic achievements. Having been on both the President's and Dean's list, it's no surprise that Ms. Kincaid is part of Honoris Causa, Columbus State University's very own Society for Honors Scholars. All while pursuing these educational and co-curricular opportunities Ms. Kincaid found the time to work as a Public Policy Research Assistant and at Chipotle in preparation for an opportunity to study abroad."
