RYLA

Inspiring Our Youth: Having Fun, Building Friendships and Serving the Community



If it's summertime in District 6900 that mean it's time for the Rotary Youth Leadership Awards, better known as RYLA!! RYLA is designed for young adults with proven leadership ability and a commitment to community service. The District 6900 RYLA camp was hosted by the **Rotary Club of Americus** and held June 2 - 6 on the campus of Georgia Southwestern State University and once again hit the high mark of 132 students sponsored by over 50 clubs.

Through RYLA, these young people from different backgrounds - home, educational, religious, and lifestyle - are brought together to work, learn, and discuss the issues that exist within their generation. They have the chance to learn and challenge themselves through team activities, large group activities, and candid, round-table discussions. RYLA programming includes individual personality profiles, conflict resolution styles, and ropes course activities designed to encourage teamwork, communication, and trust. New to the schedule this year was the addition of a service project which allowed the students to experience the Rotary motto of "Service Above Self" firsthand - over 300 paracord bracelets were hand-made by the students and will be donated to Operation Gratitude for care packages being sent out to members of our armed forces.

One of the recurring themes of RYLA is the student who accomplishes a feat he/she would have never dared to imagine before coming to camp. The most memorable of these culminating events are always the board break, allowing students to break through fears to reach goals, and the Trust Fall from a 5-foot platform into the waiting arms of teammates. And just as in recent years, most of the students who were very hesitant to spend the weekend with 130 strangers became the friends who did not want to part ways at the end. This speaks volumes to the benefit of RYLA and the positive changes it can create in young lives.

Even more telling of the long-lasting influence of RYLA is the fact that 90% of the counselors were once RYLA participants themselves - they believe in it enough to commit the time and energy to make RYLA the best experience possible. Over 70 Rotarians assisted with RYLA in some capacity, with most contributing on the club level with the nomination and selection of student participants while others provided transportation to and from RYLA, and the brave few who agreed to serve as chaperones in the dorms. Special guests this year were DG Alec Smythe, DGE Court Dowis, DGN Jim Squire, and DGND Kirk Driskell who joined us for several days volunteering as chaperones and spending time with the student teams.

RYLA aims to help students discover their potential and develop the skills needed to be leaders in their communities, careers, and everyday lives. And they achieve these goals while having fun, building friendships, and creating memories that will last a lifetime. We're already looking forward to 2019 and we hope to see you there!

Happy Rotary New Year!

The new year has begun – congratulations on your new Rotary position! Every year is a new opportunity to be an inspiration to the world. The Rotary Foundation is your tool to create change and do good in the world. This year is no different except it is your chance. Take this opportunity to step up and make a difference!

We are introducing the Winner's Circle this year in honor of Governor Court's racing life. You can join him in the winner's circle (and earn a ribbon for your club banner) by completing some challenges. First, your club must enter your goals into Rotary Club Central. As of today, only 50% of the clubs in 6900 have taken the time to do this. Make sure you are one of them! Once you have entered your goals, complete three challenges:

- **Number one - Become a 100% Paul Harris Fellow club.** Even if you have accomplished this goal

in the past, achieve it again. We all know you have added new members to your club who have not become Paul Harris Fellows yet. Make it a goal for your club.

- **Number two - Become a 100% Sustaining Member club.** This means every member of your club gives at least \$100 to The Rotary Foundation this year.
- **Number three - This challenge is multiple choice.** You only have to accomplish one of the following three items: 1) *Become a 100% Benefactor club.* This means all of your club members leave at least \$1.00 to the Foundation in their estate. Did you know that no club in our district has ever achieved this? You could be the first! OR 2) *Achieve \$25 giving per capita to PolioPlus this year.* This means that your club's total polio plus giving averages out to \$25 per member, even if only one person gives the full amount. OR 3) *Add 4% net new members in your club by June 30, 2019.*

All of your district grant proposals are in and we are awaiting funding from the Foundation so you can begin working. But in the meantime, be looking for Global Grant opportunities that you can get involved in this year. These opportunities include projects in the six areas of focus as well as scholars and Peace Fellows. Remember, The Rotary Foundation belongs to you. It doesn't work unless you do. Find those projects. Find those scholars. Support the Foundation. And inspire the world!



Update on Warm Springs Project

Annual Report for Friends of Ann Johnson and Adopt a Cottage Program Roosevelt Warm Springs

from PDG Steve Stanfield



When I last reported to you, we had reached an agreement with Georgia Department of Natural Resource (GA DNR) - The Little White House - to put the Polio Eradication Museum - in memory of Past District Governor Ann Johnson (first female District Governor of Rotary District 6900 - and in all of Georgia) at the outdoor pool at Warm Springs, Georgia. Since my last report the following has happened:

- A Memorandum of Agreement has been signed between Georgia Department of Natural Resources and The Roosevelt Warm Springs Development Fund to guide the project to completion
- The design of the museum by the firm of Murphy & Orr - Rotarians from Lake Spivey Clayton County has been approved by our steering committee and GA DNR
- A mid project review was held at the Little White House with representatives from GA DNR, The Roosevelt Warm Springs Development Fund, and Murphy & Orr - the design, layout, and displays were approved at this meeting
- Rotary International has been in communication with us and is assisting in the verification of the information about the eradication of polio to be used in the exhibits
- Funds are sufficient for the completion of the museum, but more funds might be raised for pool restoration at a future date
- Estimated date for completion is for December of 2018, with a grand opening for donors and guest scheduled tentatively for late December or January of 2019

Further, I am please to report that the Director of Roosevelt Warm Springs has designated two cottages for renovation and repurposing. One cottage will be used for the Autism Spectrum Program and the other for the Vocational Assessment Program. Plans for their new use have been drawn and the State of Georgia Department of Vocational Rehabilitation has committed funds to assist with the cottages - the remainder of the funds necessary will be provided by the RWS Development Fund. Any remaining Rotary and Friends

of Ann Johnson donations – not used on the museum and pool -- will be used for cottage repurposing.

We appreciate your assistance and support of this memorial to Ann. We will keep you informed of Grand Opening dates and events. We look forward to seeing all of you at the museum and pool near the first of the year.

GRSP Update

GRSP Class of 2018-2019

This year Georgia Rotary Clubs will host 47 students from 13 countries, attending 23 schools in Georgia. District 6900 will be hosting 21 students from Brazil, Pakistan, Columbia, Turkey, Germany, Scotland, Sweden, England, Denmark, Zimbabwe and Nigeria. Of those, 15 are female and six are male. 42 of our 68 clubs are hosting a student for next year. The other Districts will also be hosting students from France, Sri Lanka and Turkey. From our District, we are sending one student to UGA, two students to Columbus State, two students to Georgia Southwestern, two students to Kennesaw, five students to Oglethorpe, one student to North Georgia, two students to Clayton State, one student to University of West Georgia, three students to Valdosta, one student to LaGrange and one student to Georgia State University.

This is a good time of year to take a look at your student's "suitcase" to be sure that they have the things that they need to make their stay in a dorm a pleasant one. It is very easy to just recycle everything that your student from last year had, but it is a gift to your new student to take a look at what you have and throw out a few things that may have become worn out over the years. Some students take excellent care of the items in their suitcase, but others ... well ... not so much.

Also, be sure to write your student over the summer before they arrive to be sure that there are no miscommunications about their arrival. You want as many people as possible at the airport to welcome them. As I look through the pictures of students over the 20 years plus that I have been involved with GRSP, it is fun to reminisce about how excited the student was to see so many American faces beaming at them with their welcome signs and flags. How wonderful would you feel, if you were met at the airport by so many people!!!!

For those of you with young children, invite your student to your home for a meal or even out to a restaurant with the kiddies. The students enjoy this and your children will learn about the world through the eyes of young people living the dream of spending a year in Georgia, but with remembrances of home.

On a Personal Note

This summer I was lucky enough to travel to Scandinavia for a couple of weeks with my grandchild, who is 13. I wanted to see all of my students, but as I count my Scandinavians, I knew that it was just not possible. I was able to spend an entire day with the very first student that I hosted, who happened to be from Denmark. My granddaughter and I were able to meet Anita's two children and her husband and to talk about old times and new times. This is a picture of us standing on her balcony in Copenhagen.

Many of us host families have had the wonderful experience of seeing our students in their own environment. We have attended weddings and have become GRSP grandparents over the years. We have had our students' families visit with us and some of us have been lucky enough to visit them. Would I have had the chance to spend a week in a vacation home on the coast of Sweden had I not hosted a student? Would I have been able to pick strawberries with the locals on a "pick your own farm" in Sweden, if I had not hosted a student? Would I have dined in Sweden with friends for lunch under a hot June sun? Would I have walked nearly 10 miles in one day to see major sites in Copenhagen with a local? Would I have eaten in a Mexican Restaurant and been invited to a party for a newly graduated doctor that was a previous GRSP student? Probably not ... unless I had hosted a GRSP student. Think about it!

Goodbye to the Class of 2017-2018

Many of us said goodbye to our students from last year just in the last couple of weeks. We have a couple of students that will be staying in the States either on another scholarship or as summer interns, but for the most part they have all returned home. One of our students, Maria Augusta "Magu" Ferreira de Assis Moura, from Brazil, attended Clayton State University. She wrote in the GRSP Yearbook:

For a year and a half leading up to and during the application process, GRSP was all that I wanted. I didn't think I was going to get it though, so when I did I couldn't really believe it. Even when I finally arrived in the U.S. parts of me still didn't think it was real. Little by little, it all became true. A lot wasn't like I thought it was going to be..... Being able to visit different states in the country, and getting to know different places in Georgia was great, as was learning a bit more about American culture every single day.

This was undeniably an amazing opportunity to be able to study subjects I wasn't going to learn back in my home country. I have definitely learned and grown so much as a person due to this incredible year. I am incredibly grateful to everyone who made this opportunity possible for me: my host families, my trustee and last but not least families that weren't assigned as my host families but did welcome me as one of them. I had the best time with all of them.

The most absolutely amazing part of this year is the friendships I have made with other GRSPs from all over the world that I am going to cherish for the rest of my life. It was incredible now even during our first get-togethers I was able to tell that these friendships will last forever. I will never forget each and every one of you, especially all of our crusty moments! I have learned about different cultures from completely different places in the world, tried different types of food and just bonded with other amazing kids! Now I have a place to crash anywhere in the world, and my home is always going to be open to those whom I spent this year with.

Gratefulness is the word I want to finish this with. I am grateful for all I experienced, everyone I met, and everything I was able to do. Thank you, GRSP, for the best year of my life.

The rest of the Basic Mediation Training at the New York Peace Institute was absolutely wonderful and built upon the skills I had learned in my Applied Conflict Resolution Skills course at the University of Bradford. The trainer, Brad Heckman, has worked in the field of international mediation as well as community mediation for the past 25 years and has great insights and techniques. I really enjoyed the training and feel more confident as I pursue international mediation as a profession.

I have just completed my first week interning with the NGO Search for Common Ground. I am really looking forward to working with them over the next 10 weeks since they do great work around peacebuilding and conflict transformation among communities in Lebanon as well as inside Syria. I am working with the Programs Department which means I help with writing grant proposals and editing final reports (which I did this week), research new opportunities and write concept papers, and help out various projects on written material. It's an ideal chance to get to know all the projects that Search in Beirut works on and learn about their approaches to conflict. Next week I'll be meeting with the team that works on mediation efforts in Syria and brainstorming on ways I can support them due to my prior work on the Syrian conflict. Really looking forward to it!



Decatur Rotary Foundation Community Grants Recipients

In May, the **Decatur Rotary Club** presented \$18,000 in grants to non-profit organizations based in DeKalb County that focus on youth literacy and at-risk youth in DeKalb County. The 2018 recipients included:

- *Friends of Refugees* - Focus: Use funds to purchase books for literacy program which assists refugee families with children by providing them with one book a month for eight months; amount will pay for eight books each for 50 families.
- *Clarkston Community Center* - Focus: Use funds for purchasing design software for use in Art and Entrepreneurship program focused on teaching refugee children how to make furniture from recycled materials some of which will be donated to newly arrived refugee families, summer program.
- *Global Village Project* - Focus: Use funds to support school for newly arrived refugee girls 11-18 years old.
- *DeKalb Library Foundation* - Focus: Use funds to buy materials for Mobile Makerspace Kits for use in DeKalb Public Library STEAM programs for children 8-15 years old, amount will pay for 5-6 kits.
- *REAP* - Focus: Use funds for Summer Reading Camp for 40 economically disadvantaged City of Decatur students in 1st to 5th grade and to train 15 City of Decatur teachers in reading instruction, amount will pay for four students for a two week camp experience
- *Gentle Spirit Church* - Focus: Use funds to purchase supplies for personal hygiene kits to be distributed to homeless persons. Amount will cover cost for 290 kits.
- *Boys & Girls Club* - Focus: Use funds to operate Book Club at Decatur Boys and Girls Club, will involve 75 children, amount will pay for materials for four book bins.
- *Shalom International Ministry* - Focus: Use funds to create a self-directed Learning Center for 26 refugee and immigrant children from the Clarkston area.
- *Decatur Housing Authority* - Focus: Use funds for STAR Academic Summer Camp for 70 children 3rd to 8th grade from the Decatur Housing Authority residences, amount will pay for all supplies and instructors for camp.
- *Our House* - Focus: Use funds to purchase supplies and instructional materials for Early Childhood Education Program focused on preparing homeless children for kindergarten, six week summer program.
- *Decatur Makers Club* - Focus: Use funds to expand Girl Makers Club which provides STEM related education to middle school girls by involving them in hands on creative programs, funds will allow for expansion of Club to students living in the Decatur Housing Authority residences and Clarkston

area.
